
ADVANCING THE ARTS ENRICHING LIVES















he school began operating in the fall of 2003 as a response to budget cuts in the arts leaving the school district with only two, full-time art teachers serving nearly 35,000 students. Offering programs in Drama, Dance, Music, and Visual Art, the Jessye Norman School of The Arts may have been the only avenue to art enrichment for many students.



Founding Board Chair Dr. Linda Scales saw the need and acted along with Ellis Johnson and others to reach out to Jessye Norman asking for her support and to bring her values and name to the organization. She enthusiastically agreed and helped to raise the first \$50,000 to start the school.



Since 2003, JNSA has moved in to its own 18,000 sq.ft. building donated by Peter Knox IV, renovated 9,000 square feet of the building, and grown programming to serve more than 400 students in free programming every year and more than 2000 in all programs combined. JNSA has developed programs serving students and adults in Aiken, Edgefield, Richmond, Columbia, and Burke Counties.



Beyond providing free arts education, the Jessye Norman School also offers services impacting the entire community. The school offers ASL learning classes, home school enrichment, private music tutoring, and classes for local seniors. The school also hosts services for students in the foster care system and students of military families. The benefit concert helps support all of these services.





Jessye Norman, one of the world's most celebrated performing artists, was acclaimed for her performances in wide range of leading roles with the world's premier opera companies, in solo recitals and in concerts of her cherished classical repertoire with preeminent orchestras all over the globe, as well as her latest artistic expansion with her jazz ensemble and the extensive programming of music from the American musical theater, which she entitled: AMERICAN MASTERS. She was the recipient of many awards and accolades, including forty honorary doctorate degrees from colleges, universities, and conservatories around the world, five Grammy awards including the 'Lifetime Achievement Award', the National Medal of the Arts received at the White House from President Obama in 2010, and was a Kennedy Center Honors recipient. In France, an orchid was named for her by the National Museum of Natural History. She was a Commandeur de L'Orde des Arts et des Lettres and was an Officier of the Legion Française. Her community service included trustee board memberships at The New York Public Library, Carnegie Hall, The Dance Theatre of Harlem, the Lupus Foundation, Paine College, and the New York Botanical Garden. She was called upon often to speak to her passionate involvement and advocacy of arts education. The school for the arts in her hometown of Augusta, Georgia which bears her name, enabled her to support and see first-hand the extraordinary work of an equally dedicated staff of teachers and auxiliary personnel. Students who would otherwise not be able to avail themselves of private tutelage in the arts grew into the fullness of their talents and gifts as they developed their own sense of community and citizenship. She absolutely glowed at any mention of The Jessye Norman School for the Arts and was grateful indeed for this tangible, living opportunity to address the need for education in the arts in the town where her own studies and training began. Her memoir, STAND UP STRAIGHT AND SING!, released in May of 2014 and in France in the summer of 2015, chronicles her childhood in Augusta, Georgia and man experiences of her professional life as it unfolded all over the world over a period of four decades!

PERFORMERS

Asleif Willmer- Soprano

Hailed as "a most incredible voice" (Arizona Daily Star) with "glowing color and exceptional artistry" (Schmopera), soprano Asleif Willmer delights audiences with her captivating stage presence, nuanced artistry, and polished lyric-coloratura soprano voice. Asleif has sung leading roles in several opera houses including Florida Grand Opera, Opera Saratoga, International Vocal Arts Institute, Brevard Music Festival, and City Lyric Opera. Highlights include Pamina in Die Zauberflöte, Adina in L'elisir d'amore, Baby Doe in The Ballad of Baby Doe, Juliette in Romeo et Juliette, Tytania in A Midsummer Night's Dream, and Zerlina in Don Giovanni of which she garnered the praise, "Willmer won the affections of the audience... freely reaching her high notes, sweetly seductive, physically and vocally" (Miamiartzine). Equally at home in the concert hall, Asleif is an artist with the GRAMMY-nominated True Concord Voices and Orchestra and has been a featured soloist internationally and nationally. Solo highlights include Handel's Messiah, Brahms Requiem, Poulenc Gloria, and Haydn's The Creation. She has also received top awards from many organizations, including the Metropolitan Opera Laffont Auditions, Classical Singer Competition, and MTNA Competition. Asleif received her Doctor of Musical Arts from Arizona State University.

Veronica Williams-Mezzo Soprano

Veronica Williams Is an emerging mezzo-soprano known for her thrilling instrument and "overwhelming authority" on stage. Most recently, Ms. Williams sang with Opera Theatre of the Rockies in Scott Davenport Richards' Blind Injustice. In the fall season of 2022, she served as a recitalist for the Shivers Fund in Colorado Springs and Castle Of Our Skins in Boston. She also appeared as a background vocalist on Michael Bublé's Higher tour, and performed the role of The Witch in Chicago Summer Opera's production of Humperdinck's Hansel und Gretel. In February 2022, Ms. Williams made her concert debut with Fort Worth Opera as a soloist in their prestigious Night of Black Excellence series. In 2019, she was personally invited by Maestro Sebastian Lang Lessing to join the San Antonio Symphony as their first ever Singer-In-Residence. As a result, she was the featured soloist in Leonard Bernstein's Symphony 1, Manuel De Falla's El Amor Brujo, Beethoven's 9th Symphony, and Sergei Prokofiev's Alexander Nevsky. Ms. Williams received her Master of Music Degree from Boston's New England Conservatory of Music, and her Bachelor of Music Degree from the University of Texas at Austin. Upcoming engagements include: The Messiah with the Austin Symphony Orchestra.



Dominic Armstrong - Tenor

Dominic Armstrong has established himself internationally as an artist of superb and distinguished musicality and characterization. The tenor holds degrees from Truman State University, The Juilliard School, and The Curtis Institute. This season Dominic Armstrong appears at Carnegie Hall with the American Symphony Orchestra for Schoenberg's Gurre-Lieder, singing Waldemar under the baton of Leon Botstein. He also continues his close collaboration with the Brooklyn Art Song Society, joining them in recital. In the 2022-2023 season, Mr. Armstrong debuted the role of the Steuermann in Der Fliegende Holländer with Utah Opera, continued his relationship with Opera Carolina, returning to the role of Alfredo in La traviata, and joined the Bangor Symphony for a pandemic-rescheduled Beethoven's 9th. An in-demand interpreter of modern and contemporary operas, Mr. Armstrong's notable performances include Peter Quint in Turn of the Screw (NYCO, Castleton, OnSite Opera), Arthur Dimmesdale in The Scarlet Letter (Opera Colorado, world premiere), Orville Wright in Finding Wright (Dayton Opera, world premiere), Jump Master in The Falling and the Rising (Opera Carolina), Dr. Richardson in Breaking the Waves (Beth Morrison Projects), Steve in A Streetcar Named Desire (Lyric Opera of Chicago, Carnegie Hall), Count Almaviva in The Ghosts of Versailles (Wexford Festival), Haydn and the Bartender in the world premiere performances of The Classical Style (Ojai Festival, Cal Performances, and Carnegie Hall), and the title role in Candide (Wolf Trap). The tenor is equally at home in traditional opera repertoire, having essayed suchroles as Don



José in Carmen (Kentucky Opera, Dayton Opera), Cavaradossiin Tosca (on tour in France under the baton of Emmanuel Plasson, Northwest Indiana Symphony), Alfredo in La traviata (Chautaugua Opera), Macduff in Macbeth (Syracuse Opera), Tamino in Die Zauberflöte (Dayton Opera, Piedmont Opera) and the title role in La Clemenza di Tito (Chicago Opera Theatre). Mr. Armstrong made his New York Philharmonic debut in acclaimed performances of Britten's Spring Symphony, conducted by Music Director Alan Gilbert. He has appeared as the First Jew in Salome with the Philadelphia Orchestra and Opera Philadelphia, conducted by Yannick Nézet-Séguin, as well as the Third Jew in performances of the same opera with the Boston Symphony, and Second Jew with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. In the 2016-2017 season, he traveled to Russia to perform Britten's War Requiem with the Russian National Orchestra and subsequently performed in a series of concerts, collaborating with Craig Rutenberg. He is closely tied to the works of Benjamin Britten, having also performed his Serenade with Symphony in C and the Princeton Symphony. He regularly performs standard symphonic repertoire, such as Beethoven's Ninth Symphony (Indianapolis Symphony, North Carolina Symphony, Baton Rouge Symphony), Handel's Messiah (Aiken Symphony), Mozart's Requiem (Lansing Symphony, Amarillo Symphony), Bach's Magnificat (Milwaukee Symphony), and Rachmaninoff's The Bells (Portland Symphony). Other notable recent performances include: Deutsche Oper Berlin as Parpignol in La bohème; Opera Regio Torino as the Gran Sacerdote in Idomeneo, Reverend Adams in Peter Grimes, and Heinrich der Schreiber in Tannhaüser; Opera Omaha for their inaugural ONE Festival as Lurcanio in Ariodante, Los Angeles Opera and the Center for Contemporary Opera in a double bill of two Gordon Getty one-act operas, Usher House and The Canterville Ghost, as Edgar Allen Poe and Duke Cecil of Yorkshire; and in spring 2020 he was slated to make his debut with Lincoln Center Theater in the ensemble for Intimate Apparel, with the run of preview performances interrupted due to COVID-19. Mr. Armstrong's numerous prizes and awards include being one of the Grand Finalists in the 2008 National Council Auditions with the Metropolitan Opera, a 2013 George London Foundation Winner, the SAI Vocal Competition, Gold Medal Aria Competition (Truman State University), The Sullivan Awards, Lucrezia Bori Grant. Opera Index. Gerda Lissner Award. The William Boldyga and Betty Myers Incentive Award from Annapolis Opera. NATS State and Regional winner, and he was the 2009 winner of the Liederkranz Art Song Competition. Dominic has been on faculty at The University of South Carolina since 2020. He has also served on faculty at The Chautauqua Opera Conservatory, and helped to develop the Castleton Festival/USC Immersion Program.

Ramelle Brooks - Baritone

Ramelle Brooks' noble bass voice has been described as powerful yet full of color and nuance. Ramelle is a young artist who is on the rise in the operatic community. He has been afforded the opportunity to sing roles in operas such as Sarastro in Die Zauberflöte. Doctor 6 in The Falling and Rising. Norton in La Cambiale di Matrimonio, Nardo in La Finta Giardiniera, Dr. Dulcamara in L'elisir d' amore, and Dick Deadeye in H.M.S. Pinafore. His musical credits include Smokey Joe's Cafe and The Carousel. Ramelle is also a vibrant soloist with regional choruses and symphonies. He holds a Doctor of Musical Arts and Master of Music in Performance from the University of South Carolina and a Music Education (Voice K-12) Bachelor's degree form Fayetteville State University. Ramelle supplements his academic experience serving as Director of Music at Second Calvary Baptist Church in Columbia, South Carolina. He also holds membership in the National Association of Teachers of Singing and Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity. Inc. Ramelle currently serves on the music faculty of SC State University as an Assistant Professor of Voice.



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
